
The Little Read



A Book Report Week of the Young Child April 2012

To celebrate the 2012 Week of the Young Child, the New Haven Early Childhood Council organized its third annual literacy event -- The Little Read -- a citywide reading of the bilingual book, The Very Hungry Caterpillar/La oruga muy hambrienta, distributing over 4,000 copies of this beautiful Eric Carle book to children.

The Council also partnered with community organizations that hosted an array of literacy-based events throughout the City and provided over 1,000 children's picture books for home libraries.

The week began at City Hall, where Policewoman Rose Dell read the book, <u>Keeping You Safe</u>. Each of the children received a copy of the book for their home library.



The Week of the Young Child and The Little Read were happily celebrated this year. All of us -- children, families, and teachers -- were particularly pleased by the choice of book this year, The Very Hungry Caterpillar. To quote one of our kids, "Well, I already have this book at home—but not in Spanish; so this is great!"



We did our readings on Thursday and Friday. For Thursday, we had parents read the English and Spanish versions.

Another parent provided a Bengali version. We didn't have a printed Bengali version, but the parent very kindly made a cover for us with Bengali lettering. On Friday, we again had parents read the Spanish and English versions, while two of our students read the book in Japanese. On both days everyone had a good time reading and listening to the different-sounding versions. The "Saturday" page, with "chocolate cake, ice cream cone, pickle, etc." was a big hit both days.

To make our own caterpillar, we sent home paper circles for each child & family to decorate in their own way. We've mounted the returned circles on the wall: the enormous caterpillar gets longer every day!



Many of our children do not see a father figure in the house. On this day, we invited male participation with a reading by a male volunteer in each classroom. We asked for volunteers with a poster that said: Children love being read to. It's not every day that children see and hear a father/male reading to them. Sixteen Head Start fathers/males were identified to read The Hungry Caterpillar in each classroom. Following the reading, the identified father/male role model had his book signed by the classroom teacher for him to keep. After that, a light lunch was provided to the 16 men where they received a certificate of participation from the Fatherhood Coordinator and the building administrator. We are seeking to maintain the participation of these men for future father events and look forward to other fathers/men joining in the movement of fatherhood/male involvement in early education. We made our Week of the Young Child project a study of author and illustrator Eric Carle. We started the week with a group reading of our very own copies of The Very Hungry Caterpillar book! Children were very excited that they could have the books to keep! Families were asked to enjoy the story together in English and their home language.



Throughout the week, we read both familiar and new-to-us books by Eric Carle, paying close attention to the artwork. It was a pleasure to hear children call out with excitement, "This is by Eric Carle! Let's look at the end paper!" Children created

In addition to health and nutrition, there was a lot of math work in sorting, graphing, and representing all the fruit with unifix cubes! Plus delicious fruit salad!

In the South Group, we read The Very Hungry Caterpillar many times during the Week of the Young Child, both at group time and with individual children in the cozy reading corner.

After that, we played at being little caterpillars, looking for leaves to eat, curling up in our chrysalis, and emerging as amazing butterflies. The spring time weather certainly contributed to the enthusiasm and energy that fueled our little butterflies. Out on our playground there were wonderful, colorful, pint-sized butterflies everywhere! This week of fun and excitement was topped off with the thrilling event of receiving The Very Hungry Caterpillar board book to take home!

We read this book all the time in the preschool classrooms, but this time we were able to see the book through different eyes.

Staff, children and parents had the opportunity to learn about Eric Carle's preschool experience in another country when he didn't understand the language, and the process of making the pictures for The Very Hungry Caterpillar book. It really made us reflect on how important we are in the children's lives. Everything we do and say to children affects them in different ways. Eric Carle's teacher knew that he couldn't read and write in German so she asked him to draw everything and that's what he did. This book also helped the children to learn many concepts. They learned about the days of the week, size, colors, day and night, cause and effect, sequencing, healthy (and not healthy) foods and, most important of all, building their self-esteem by letting them know that every picture that they make is just perfect.
